Talent Camp is a skills development program for creatives from diverse backgrounds, designed to provide opportunities for emerging storytellers to create new content and be employment ready for the screen sector.

The week-long state
workshops will focus on story
development, producing and
directing considerations and
career pathways, culminating
in a networking event with
experienced screen professionals.

A selection of up to 15 participants are accepted into each State Talent Camp through a competitive application process. This year, Talent Camp will take place in May 2022 across Sydney, Brisbane, Melbourne, Adelaide and Hobart.

Talent Camp is a multi-partner screen industry initiative, made possible with the support of AFTRS, Screen Australia, Screen NSW, Screen Queensland, VicScreen, South Australian Film Corporation and Screen Tasmania.

Alana Hicks

Alana is a Papua New Guinean/Australian writer, director and multiplatform creative. She was awarded first place in the 2020 SBS Emerging Writers' Competition. Her AACTA-nominated short film Chicken continues to play at festivals at home and abroad. She has just directed her first episode of broadcast TV for the ABC show PM's Daughter, and is currently in development on an original series concept about growing up mixed-raced in 90's Australia.



Majhid Heath

Majhid Heath's first short film, Brown Lips (2017), from writer/director Nakkiah Lui, screened both nationally and internationally. His second project, A Chance Affair (2018) from creator/writer Steven Oliver, screened on NITV and SBS On Demand in 2019. Majhid produced the Horror Anthology feature, Dark Place (2019) and also produced Arts TV Quiz show Faboriginal (2020). Majhid has produced several documentaries including, The Department (2022), Le Champion (2019), Power to the People – Love (2017), Cyber Dreaming (2014) and Message Stick - An Australian Storybook (2011).He's currently developing projects with Australian and international creatives through his production company, Noble Savage Pictures.



Stephen Lance

Stephen Lance is an award-winning director and writer of film and television. He wrote the screenplay for The Second, which won the Stan fully funded feature competition in 2017, and premiered on the streaming platform in 2018. My Mistress, his debut feature film, premiered at Melbourne International Film Festival in 2014. In 2015, he was nominated for an AWGIE award for best original screenplay for My Mistress. The screenplay was also selected for the No Borders market in New York and SPAAMart in 2011. He is currently working an adaptation of the best selling novel, THE SECRET LIVES OF DRESSES, and an original TV series, FORTUNE, for Hoodlum Entertainment.



Anthony Mullins

Anthony Mullins is an award-winning writer, director and script producer. Between 2015 and 2017 Anthony was a Development Executive at Matchbox Pictures, where he developed and script-edited Safe Harbour, winner of 2019 International Emmy for Best Mini-Series. Anthony script-produced the fourth season of Nowhere Boys for Matchbox, and the first season of Five Bedrooms for Ten and Hoodlum. In 2021, Anthony released Beyond the Hero's Journey: A screenwriting guide for when you've got a different story to tell, a look at the form of scripts. Anthony was the creative director of Hoodlum on several award-winning interactive projects for high-end productions, including Lost, Spooks, and The Bourne Legacy.



George Coles

George is a Wonnarua woman from the Hunter Valley region and is the First Nations Community Engagement Manager at AFTRS. A graduate of the School's Bachelor of Arts Screen: Production, George works with the First Nations and Outreach Division to deliver skills-based workshops and custom short courses to Indigenous communities and implements cultural wellbeing strategies for the First Nations students throughout the School. As a First Nations filmmaker, telling stories has always played a significant role in Georgia's life. Previously directing documentaries for NITV and assisting on community-driven projects, George is now devoting her skills to help other people tell their stories on a much bigger platform.

Within her role as Outreach Project Manager at AFTRS, Marissa supports Australia's diverse and emerging talent through initiatives like Talent Camp, Media Lab and nationwide community partnerships. Biography → Alex Philp writes both screenplays and prose. Working with her frequent collaborator, Luisa Martiri, she wrote the short films 'Milk' (2018) and 'Pools' (2020). Pools premiered at Flickerfest (2021) and was also an official selection for Show Me Shorts New Zealand and CinefestOZ. As a prose writer, her short fiction has been published in Overland, Westerly, Voiceworks and in the Review of Australian Fiction, and in 2017 she won the Rachel Funari Prize for Fiction. She has a PhD in Creative Writing from Queensland University of Technology.

In 2019, she amalgamated her content knowledge into a boutique creative agency called Lola Digital. In 2021, she was selected as an inaugural participant of the Screen Australia x Instagram First Nations Creators Program. Kantesha is currently completing a Master of Arts Screen: Business with AFTRS and she's driven to bring her stories to the big screen.

Luisa Martiri



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Luisa Martiri is a Brisbane-based filmmaker with a passion for authentic, poignant storytelling and showcasing female stories on screen.

Biography → Since the inception of Luisa's filmmaking career, she has assisted world-class television producers all while producing and directing her own short films. Most recently, she produced and co-directed the short film The Moths Will Eat Them Up, alongside writer and co-director Tanya Modini, as part of Screen Queensland's RIDE Initiative. Previously, she produced and directed the short films Pools (2020) and Milk (2018). Pools had its World Premiere at Flickerfest in 2021 and has since screened at CinefestOZ 2021 and Show Me Shorts New Zealand 2021. Currently, Luisa is building a slate of projects of her own.

Biography → Michaela is a writer and director based in Brisbane. In 2019, Michaela graduated with her Masters in Directing at Australia's National film school, AFTRS. During this time, Michaela took interest in exploring the authentic portrayal of anxiety on screen, writing and directing her first short narrative drama, My First Panic. The work had its World Premiere at Flickerfest in 2020, screened at Festival Mental in Lisbon and debuted on ABC iview for Mental Health Week. Previously, she had been directing and editing music videos within Brisbane's thriving music scene, being featured on Rage, Channel V, MTV, Pedestrian.TV and Rolling Stone Australia. In her future work, she is interested in furthering her exploration of taboo issues, the depiction of young women in cinema and reducing societal stigma surrounding mental health. Michaela is currently in pre-production for her second short film, Baptism, and developing a feature script.

She aims to deepen her knowledge by taking opportunities to work on films to gain more hands-on experience and confidence in her skills as an emerging filmmaker. Through her passion for Indigenous storytelling, Miriam hopes to bring as many Indigenous stories to the screen as she can over her career.

Biography → Nancy Cao is a Gold Coast-based writer, film director and producer whose films are often marked by their poetic approach to both style and subject matter. Her graduation short film 'A Season In Hell' (2020) was screened at the Gold Coast Film Festival, Brisbane Queer Film Festival and Taiwan International Queer Film Festival. In 2021, she wrote, produced and directed 'Delta of Venus' (2021), a short film that is currently on the festival circuit and was recently selected by the Brisbane International Film Festival and Melbourne Women in Film Festival.
